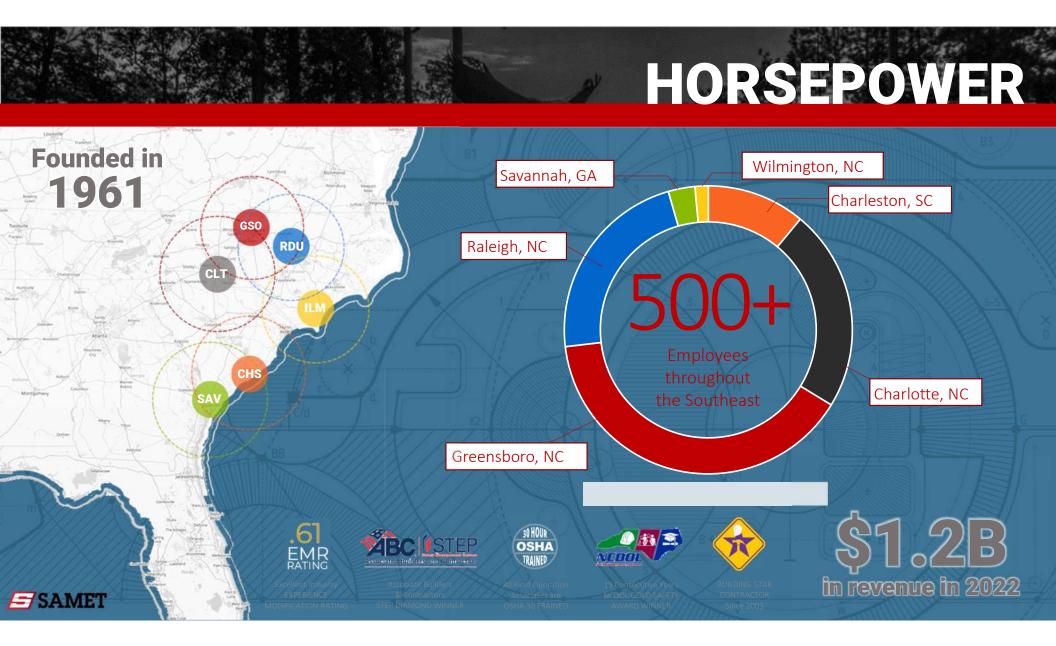

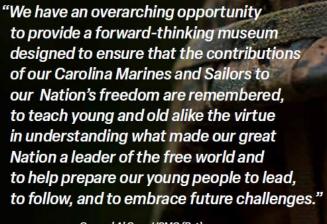
Brigadier General Kevin Stewart, USMC (Ret) & THE CAROLINA MUSEUM OF THE MARINE

Stewart retired from the United States Marine Corps in 2021 as the Director, Global Operations Center, U.S. Transportation Command. His billets prior to U.S. Transportation Command also include Commanding General of 2d Marine Logistics Group at Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune.

Stewart's roots in North Carolina go beyond the Marine Corps. He holds a degree in business administration from North Carolina State University and studied Advanced Logistics and Technology at University of North Carolina. Stewart also holds master's degrees in Information Technology Management from the Naval Post Graduate School and in Supply Chain Management at Pennsylvania State University.

Design and Interpretive Approach

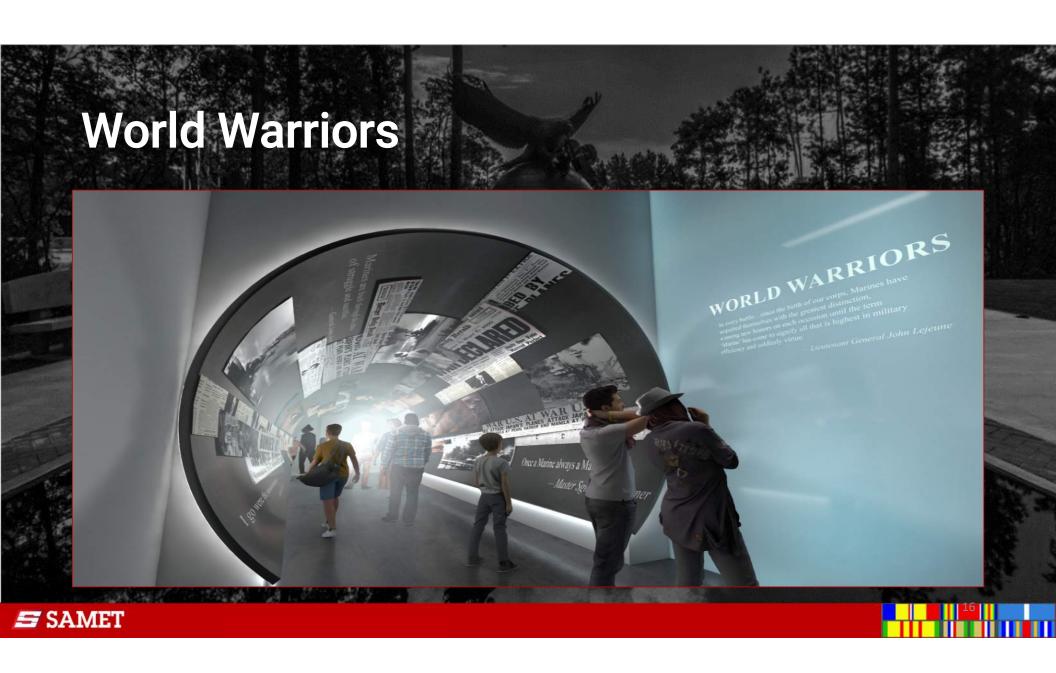
The distinctiveness of the interpretive approach for this museum includes the following:

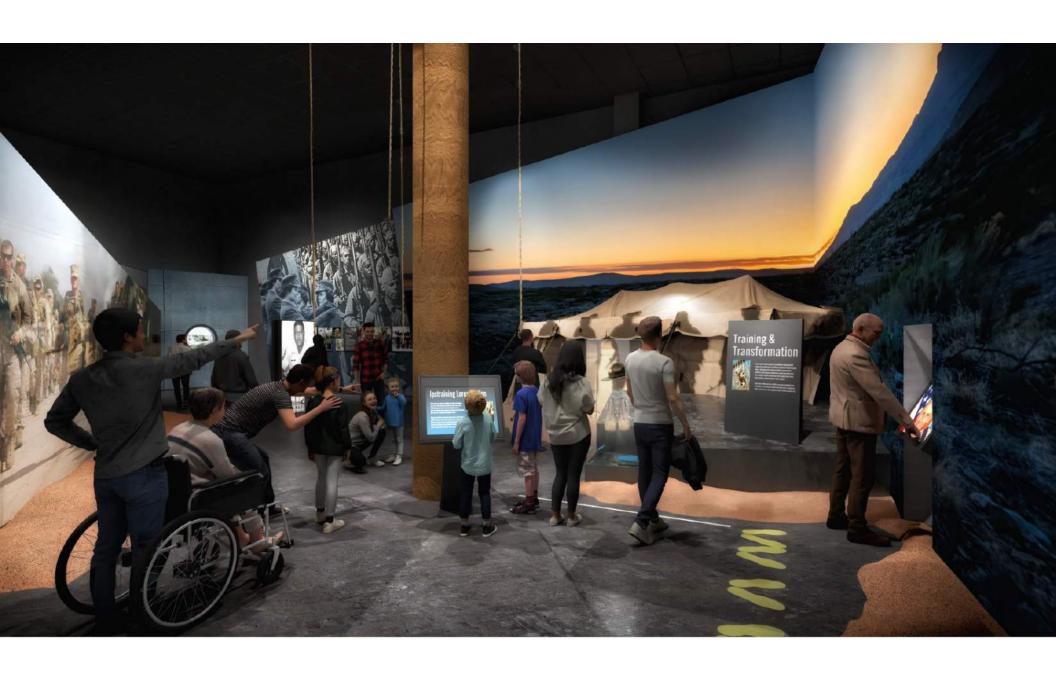
- Rooted in a sense of place the Carolinas and why the Marines came here

- The visitor journey culminates in an inspiring call to connect to core traits and principles we all can learn from Marines and put them into action



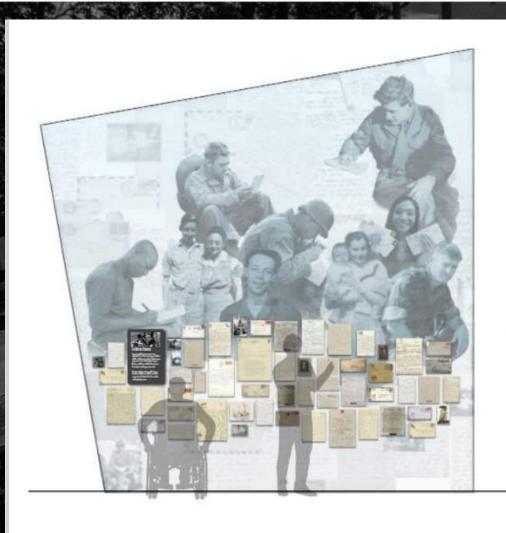












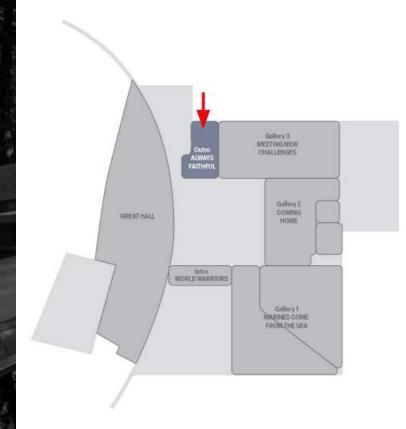
Letters Home

The final exhibit in the first gallery displays letters home from Marines to family and friends and letters they received. It illustrates the importance of contact with home and family as a powerful and sustaining aspect of the war experience and is a symbolic segue into the next gallery.

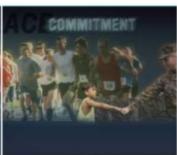


Marines in the Community mode, transitioning into Leadership Traits and Principles mode









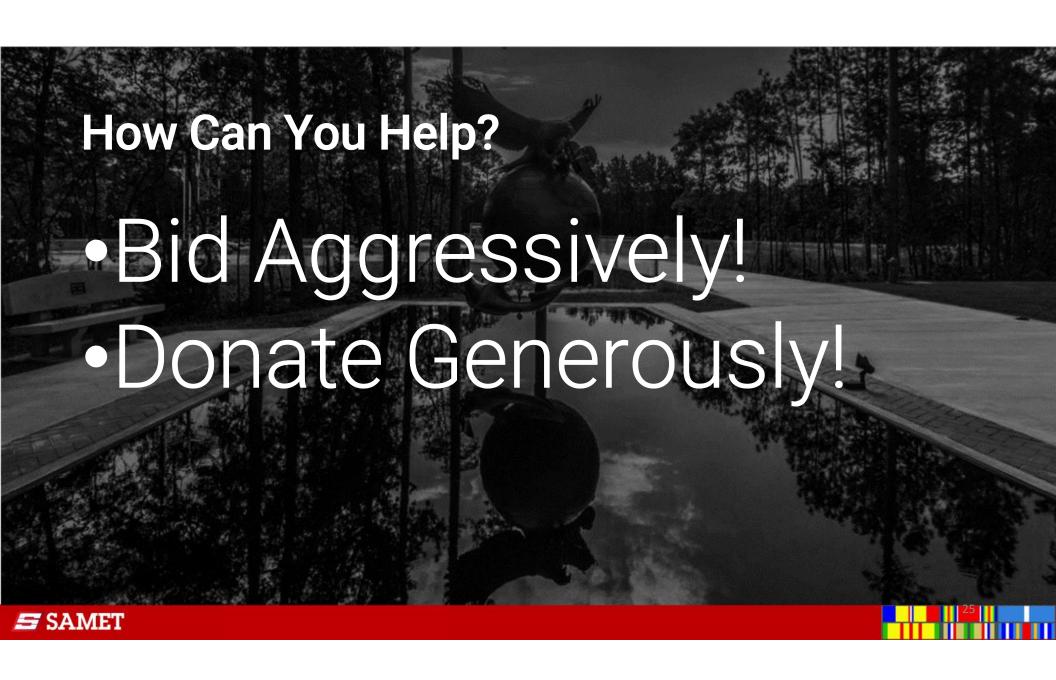

 - Properly installed flashing, weatherproofing, and air to be barriers

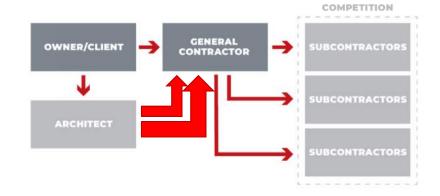

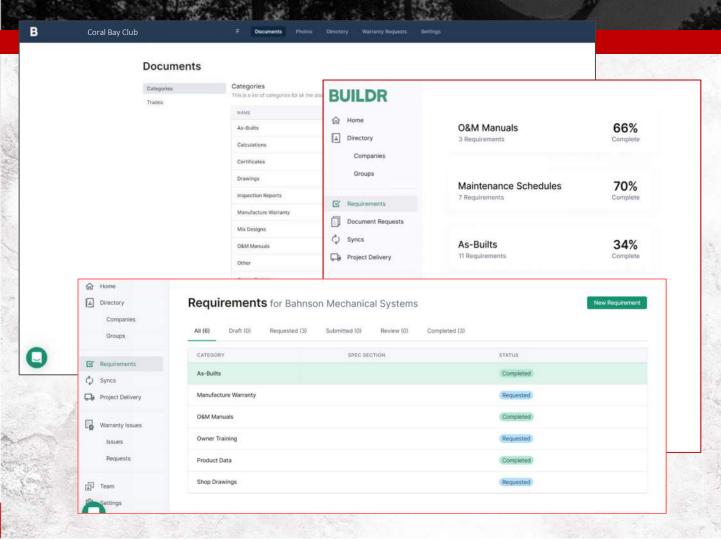

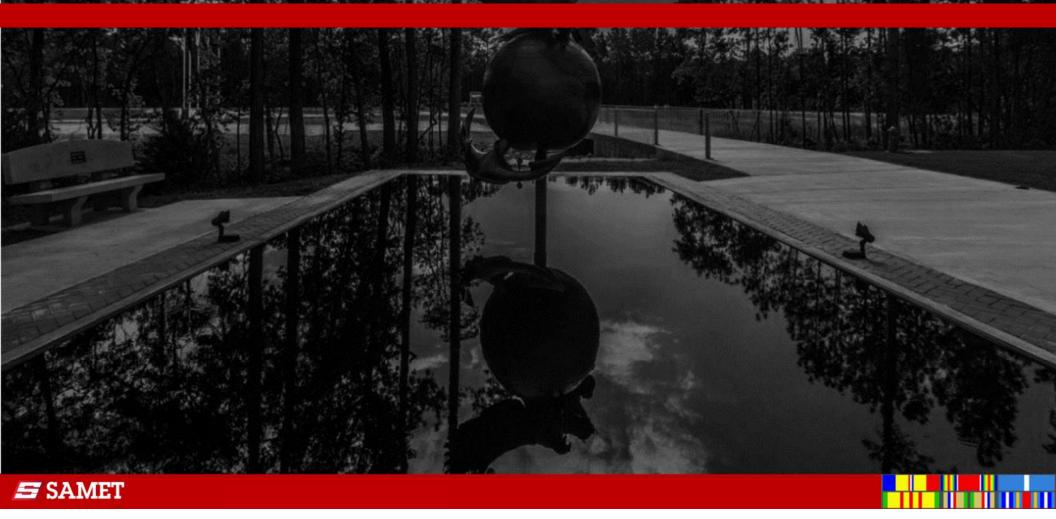
